Characteristics: Broad-leaved, deciduous shrub

Appearance:

Height - 3 to 10 ft. Aerial Spread - up to 8 ft. Flower Color - White in flat-topped clusters Flowering Period - Late May through early June Fruit Color - Blue to black berries Fruiting Period - Early September through late November

Habitat (Community): Fresh tidal marshes, non-tidal marshes, shrub swamps, forested wetlands, moist woods

Hydrology:

Indicator status – Facultative wetland Salinity - Resistant; tolerates infrequent flooding by water containing some salt Non-Tidal Regime - Seasonally inundated or saturated

Wildlife Benefits: (Fruit) food for common flicker, eastern phoebe, brown thrasher, American robin, eastern bluebird, white and red-eyed vireos, and pileated woodpecker; (Food, Cover, and Nesting) for ruffed grouse, brown thrasher, and gray catbird.

Distribution: Southeastern Massachusetts, south to Florida and Texas, west to Pennsylvania, West Virginia, and Tennessee
